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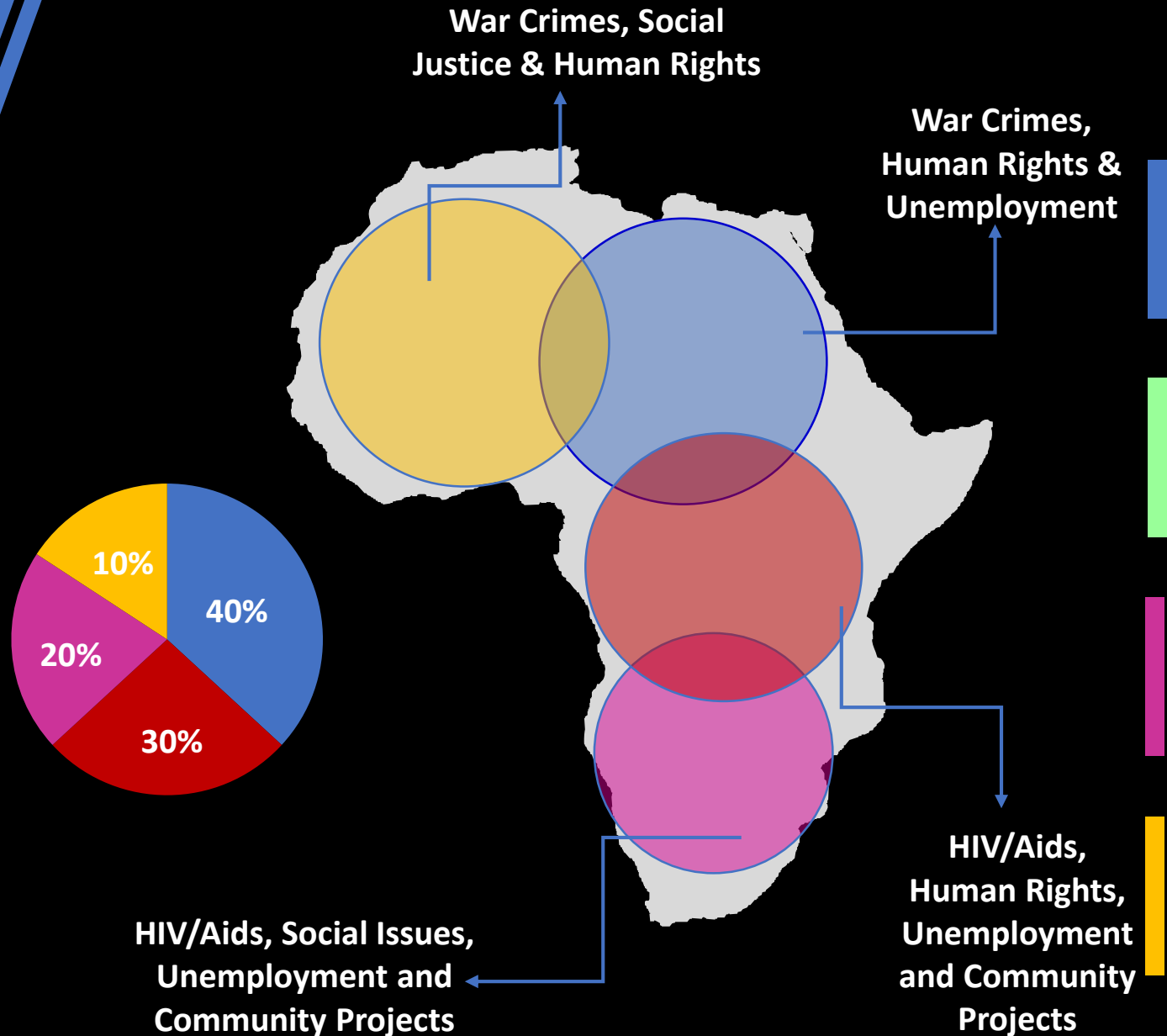

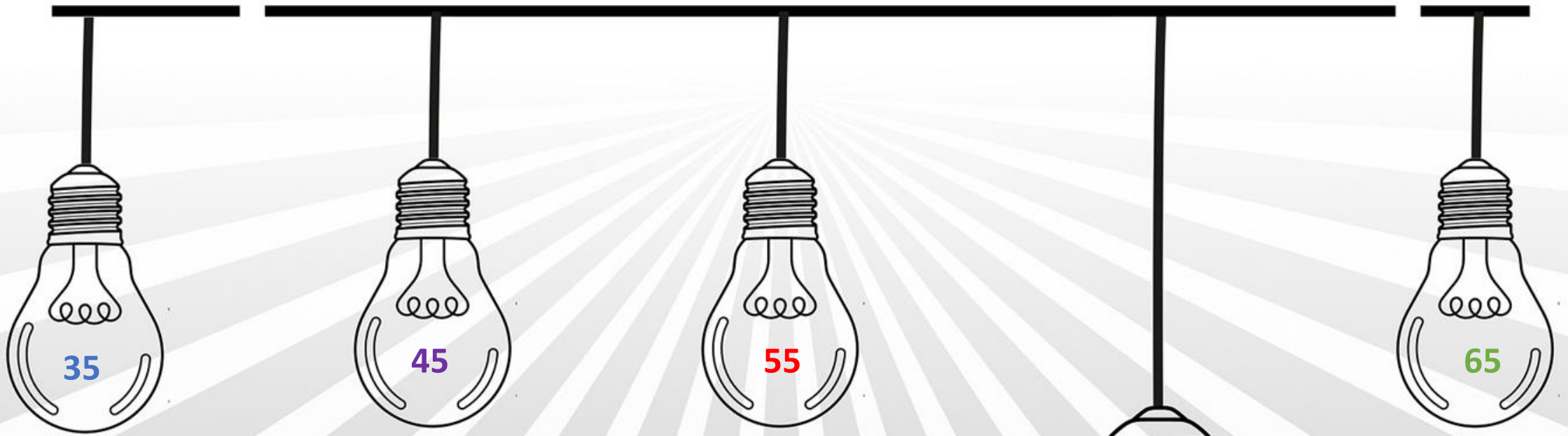

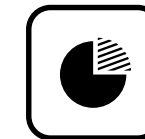
## UN / NGO's / NPO's / NPC's

# WHAT NEW TREATMENTS FOR PAEDIATRIC HIV ARE NEEDED?

UNAIDS targets state that 95% of children should be on treatment by 2025. More child-friendly medicines are needed to roll-out treatment to more babies and young children, who are either receiving no treatment or suboptimal treatments. Access is also a problem: **only 57% of children with HIV received antiretroviral treatment in 2022.**

- ❑ **A better treatment for babies and young children** would ideally be safe, easy to give, well-tolerated and palatable, heat-stable, and readily dispersible in commonly used food and liquids. It must also carry minimal risk for developing resistance, be compatible with drugs against tuberculosis, and affordable.
- ❑ **What paediatric HIV treatments are we working on?** We aim to help end the neglect of paediatric HIV by developing optimal child-friendly antiretroviral formulations for children living with HIV, with a special focus on babies and young children who are at the highest risk of dying without treatment.
- ❑ **How is HIV in children treated?** At present, HIV cannot be cured, but it can be managed with combinations of antiretroviral drugs. However, due to the relatively low number of children living with HIV compared to adults, research on new HIV medicines specifically for children has been neglected. The World Health Organization (WHO) recommends first-line treatment for babies and children of a boosted protease inhibitor with two nucleoside reverse transcriptase inhibitors in a combination of ABC + 3TC or ZDV + 3TC. Until recently, the only protease inhibitor available for young children was LPV/r, available in a form that was:

- 1) Not child-friendly (the syrup tastes terrible and contains 42% alcohol)
- 2) Not suitable for poor communities because it needs to be stored in a fridge
- 3) Difficult to store and transport.

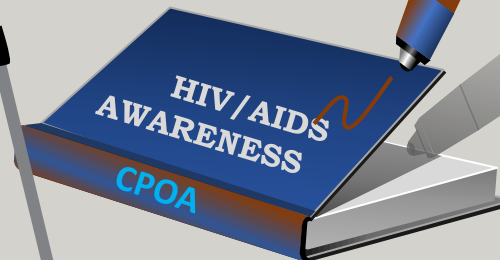

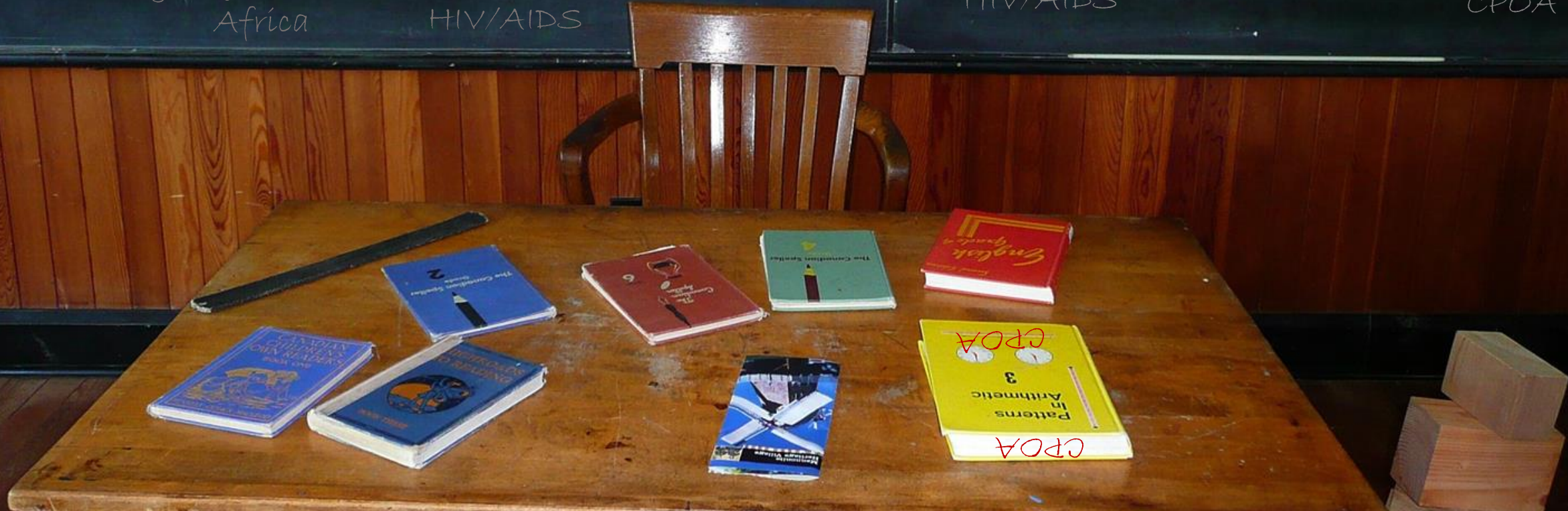

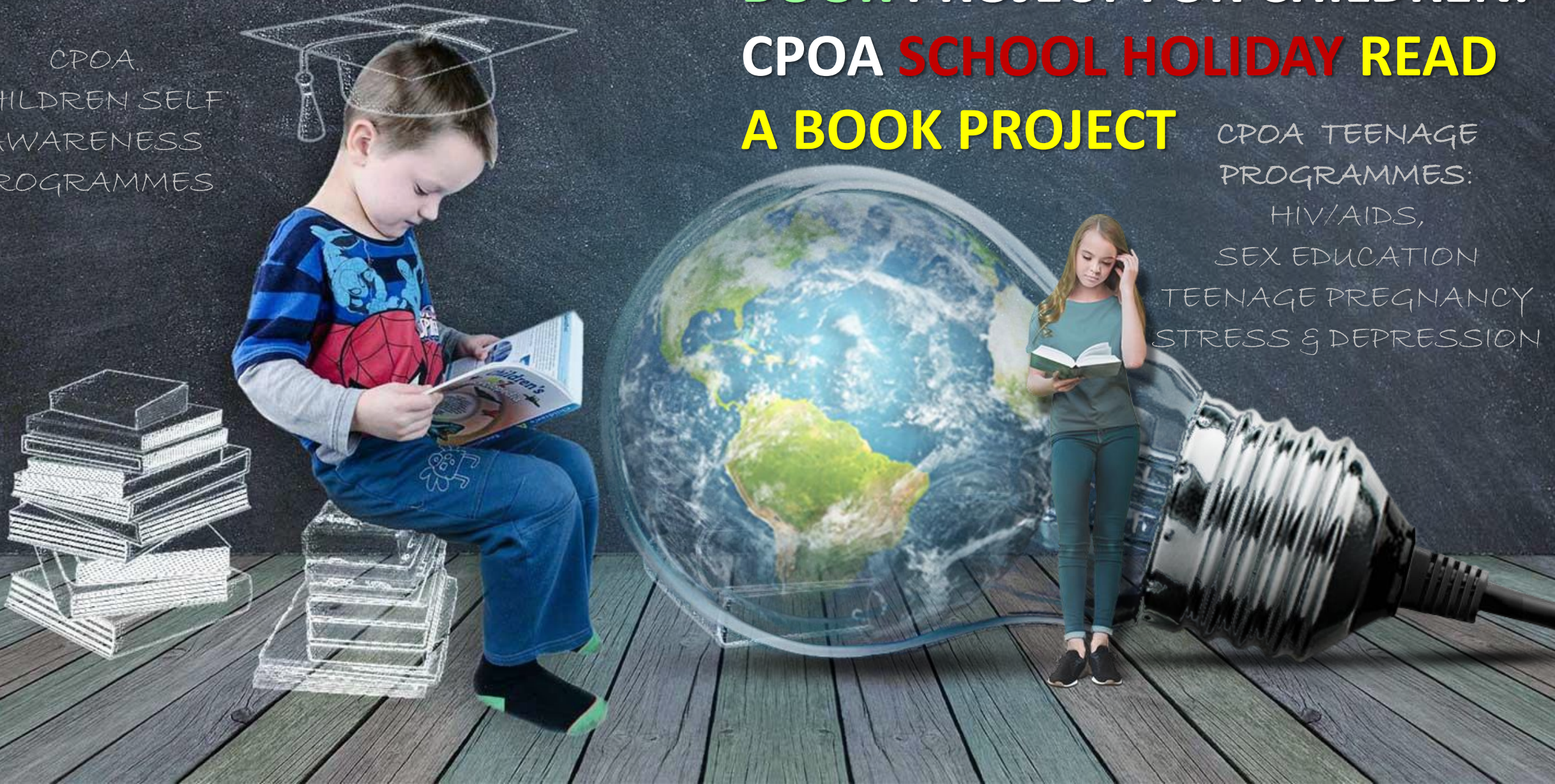

# CPOA educational activities – offering knowledge during School Break

CPOA embarks on transformational educational activities for children during school holidays. Because technology has expanded across the globe influencing children, kindergartens to teens; CPOA offers profound and astounding educational games and activities for kids during school holidays.

# 01 Prevention of Vertical Transmission

Social Protection can reduce the risk of HIV infection and poor treatment outcomes by addressing some of the key drivers of HIV among children, adolescents and women, such as poverty, gender inequality and lack of access to education or inability to stay in school.

# 02 Treatment in Children Living with HIV

Get Strengthening maternal and child health is critical to improving the whole continuum of care for children – from testing to initiation of optimal treatment to lifelong retention in care. Expanding early infant diagnosis, including thorough innovative point of care (POC) technology that delivers test results faster, can help to ensure that infants start treatment as soon as they are diagnosed.

# 03 HIV Sensitive Social Protection

There is a growing body of evidence that suggests that social protection can reduce the risk of HIV infection and poor treatment outcomes by addressing some of the key drivers of HIV among children, adolescents and women, such as poverty, gender inequality, and lack of access to education or ability to stay in school. Social protection covers a range of public and private economic and social policies and programmes that aim to reduce the consequences of poverty, vulnerability and exclusion across the life course.

# 04 HIV in Adolescence

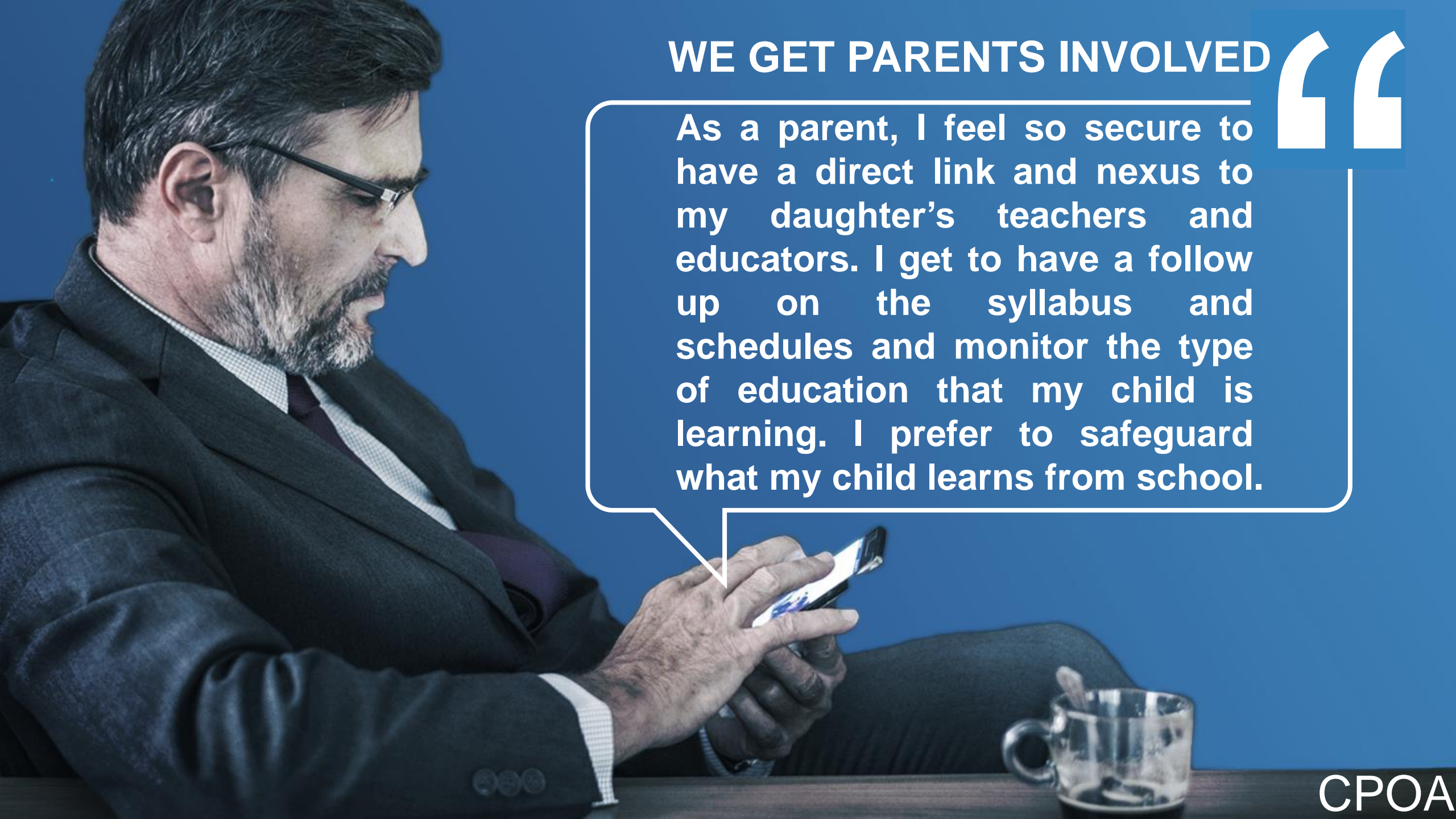
With increased investments and promising new prevention tools, HIV prevention is experiencing a renaissance. Yet, the rate of decline in new HIV infections among adolescents remains insufficient to meet global targets. Between 2010 and 2020, there was a 34 per cent decline in new HIV infections among adolescents aged 10 – 19, a far cry from the target of a 75 per cent reduction for this period.

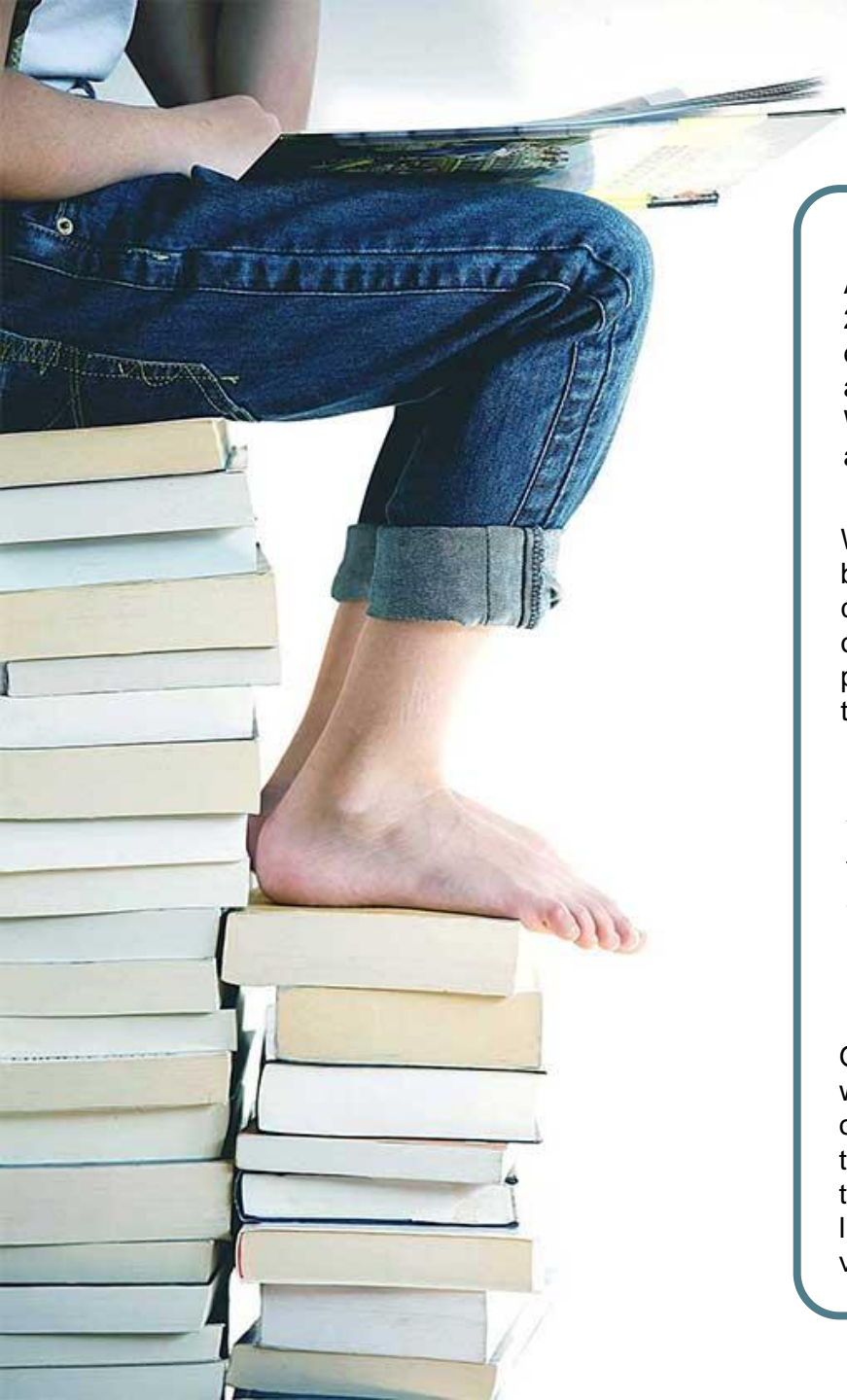


## WE GET PARENTS INVOLVED

## Treatment and Care of children and adolescents with HIV/Aids 2030 AGENDA

An estimated 1.8 million children aged 0-14 were living with HIV at the end of 2019, and 150 000 children were newly infected. An estimated 100 000 children died of AIDS-related illnesses. To reduce HIV-related mortality and morbidity among this highly vulnerable population, early testing and treatment is essential. Without access to testing and treatment, 50% of children with HIV will die by the age of 2, and 80% will not live to their fifth birthday.

WHO recommends that infants born to mothers living with HIV are tested for HIV by two months of age, during breastfeeding, and when breastfeeding ends given continued risk of transmission during this period. Older children, especially offspring and siblings of persons infected with HIV, should also be tested in high prevalence regions. Community-based outreach and testing can improve access to testing while mitigating HIV-related stigma.

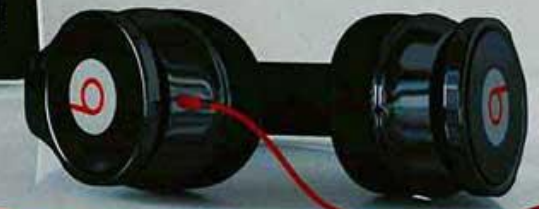
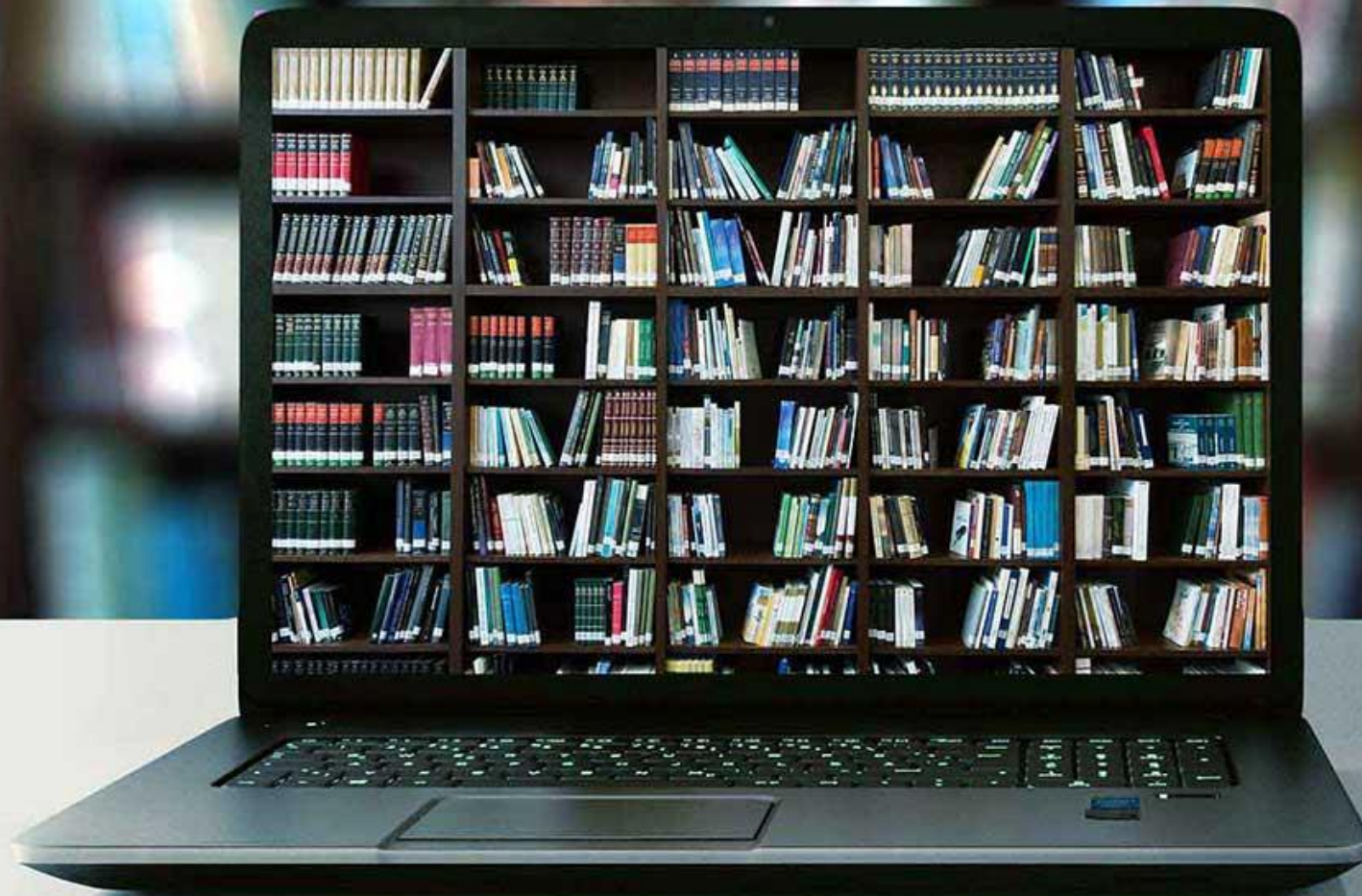
HIV-positive children should be started on antiretroviral drugs (ARV) immediately. Yet in 2018, almost half of all children living with HIV were not taking ARVs. Once treatment begins, children must take their medicine regularly to stay healthy into adolescence and adulthood. Failure to suppress the HIV virus remains a serious problem among children, aggravated by a lack of child-friendly formulations of the newest and most effective ARVs designed for adults.

Globally in 2019, an estimated 1.7 million adolescents (10-19 years old) were living with HIV and an estimated 190 000 were newly infected with HIV. Compared to other populations, adolescents face additional barriers in accessing testing and treatment, including health services that are not adapted to their needs and policies that require parental consent for services. HIV-positive adolescents also are less likely than adults to adhere to their treatment regularly, resulting in lower rates of viral suppression and lower declines in mortality.





CPOA works with many stakeholders in the Agricultural and Training Sector. We offer FREE farming training programmes to students in **Special Schools** throughout Africa as part of our Social Responsibility and Community Projects. Through our monitoring and evaluation assumption sample from the few schools we trained in African countries, we tenaciously believe that we can make a considerable transformation by offering sustainable farming skills to the learners. The African market economy has proclivities to disregard and ostracize to the periphery of the economy the ABET learners and students from Special Schools. CPOA seeks to impart Agricultural Skills to the marginalized learners for a “do it yourself program” skills development. We want to turn **students with disabilities** into **students with abilities**. We want to turn students who are **disabled** into students who are **abled**.

CPOA partners with Le Vera Institute Pty Ltd, which is an International Human Capital Development Institute based in South Africa, accredited by AGRISETA. The company focuses on Training and Facilitation Programmes within the corporate world, public and private schools. We are founded on the principle that training "should bring about the desired change in behaviour" to drive tangible and solid business results and social transformational output.

Le Vera institute explores critical metrics in Agricultural Projects both theory and practical activities and Project Management in farming. Working together with CPOA, we produce services that guarantee success in huge and small projects. CPOA has done Farming training to more than 70 Special Schools in Africa and we have seen an opportunity to provide transformational agricultural services throughout the continent. We want to train students in Special and ABET Schools on Agriculture for sustainable development.

## **CPOA BIOGAS ENERGY PROJECTS [AGRICULTURE]**

### **ALL SPECIAL SCHOOLS AGRI PROJECTS TO RUN ON BIOGAS AS THE MAIN ENERGY SOURCE**

CPOA installs state-of-the-art methane digesters for Farm projects. The Biogas Plant produces electricity utilizing animal manure and crop waste from the farm. With biogas technology, waste is stored in a specially built container called bio-digester or biogas plant. Besides producing fuel, biogas plants have the added benefit of producing high-nutrient manure, or organic fertilizer and encouraging better sanitation on farms. Biogas is a renewable source of energy.

Le Vera Institute is developing bio-energy villages to show how biogas can be used to get the most out of local synergies. The villages will provide electricity and heating to its residents. The biogas plants will provide a guaranteed supply of energy. Development in the rural areas is promoted and efficient cycles which represent major contributions to environmental protection are created.

There is no other use of energy is as efficient as biogas utilization in a co-generation plant. Biogas co-generation plants simultaneously generate both electricity and heat. Co-generation plants convert between 80 and 90 percent of energy from biogas into heat and electricity.

Our systems are highly efficient, profitable, and very reliable. Services include development, planning and the construction of biogas plants. Technical and biological support is offered to customers. These services will help to create employment to Special Schools' students.



## PROJECT BENEFITS

Biogas plants allow farms to address two common farming challenges: obtaining energy at sustainable prices and properly disposing of agricultural and animal wastes like cow dung and chicken manure. The project is rewarding in terms of its economic return. The plant will be seen as a successful demonstration project for Special Schools' students. We expect many other farms to follow because the territory in the rural regions has been chronically troubled with energy demands that traditional sources, like coal and government electricity, have not been able to fulfill.

- A Biogas Plant will provide some heating and all electrical needs for your Dairy Project in addition to revenue from electricity sales.
- Electricity that meets the power needs for your dairy project.
- Heat from the water jacket and engine exhaust is collected and used to heat the digester, milk house, parlor, and feed lanes.
- A pathogen-free bedding product for your cattle.
- Odor reduction and clean air in the area
- Organic fertilizer (Processed Manure).
- Financially viable and lucrative – it saves money
- Profit making through biogas – selling electricity
- Government buys extra energy produced from the biogas plant.
- The farm owns the carbon credits associated with electricity production.
- The electricity produced from the plant will reduce the production of greenhouse gases.

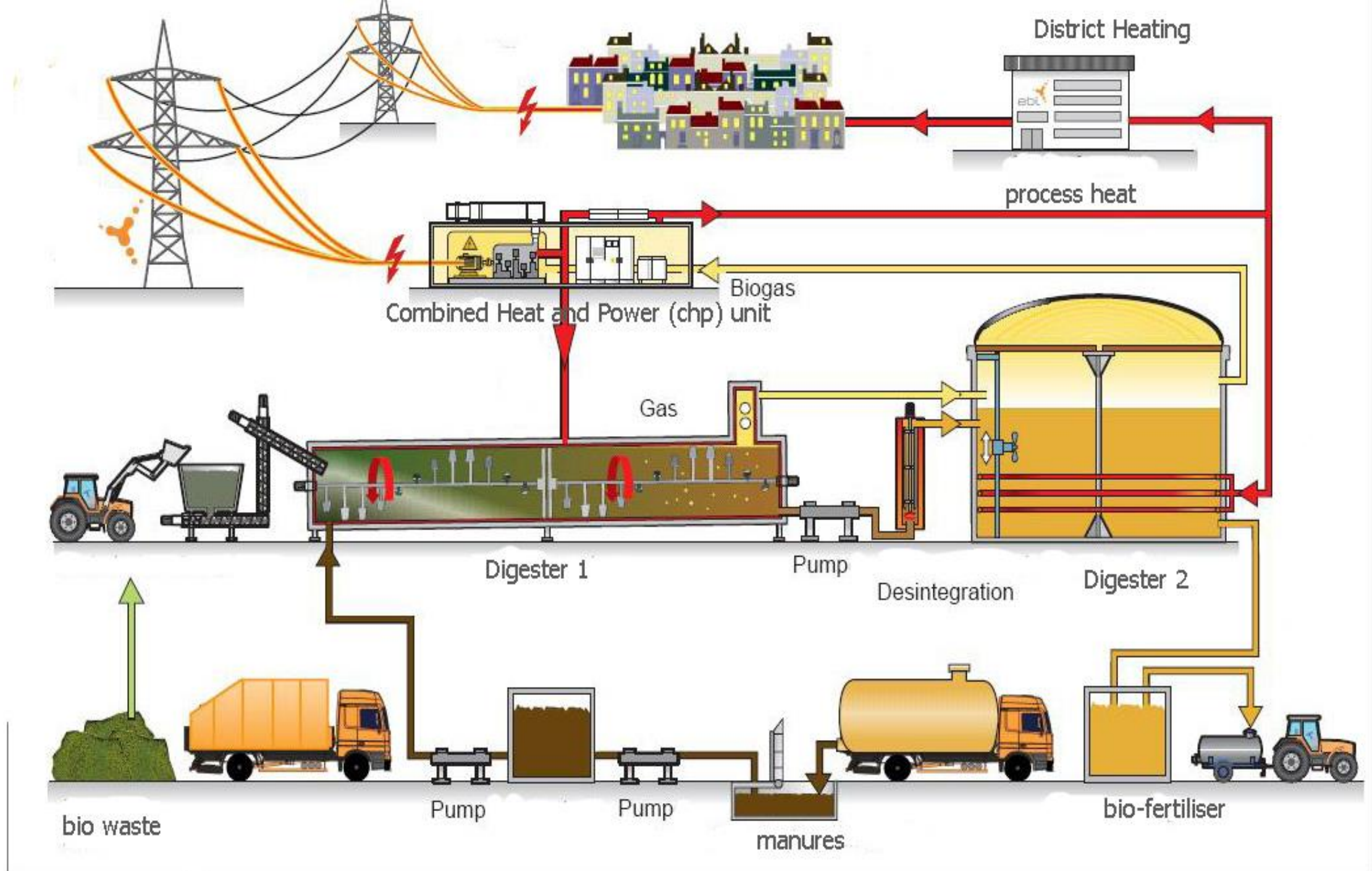

Large scale digesters (>250 kW): large facilities e.g., municipal solid waste, abattoirs, farms, wastewater treatment facilities, etcetera.





## CPOA RURAL AGRICULTURE PROJECTS

CPOA wants to help learners in special schools to operate projects that help in self-sustenance and community development and long-term projects that will grow and continue to exist from generation to generation. We initiate the projects and manage them for a limited period ranging from five to ten years, while mentoring the learners. The learners will be involved hands-on right from the onset.

Each community involved in the Special Schools' farming activities will have projects designed according to suitability of their area, depending on availability of land, water, labour, markets, climatic conditions, soil types and other factors.

We aim to empower the communities directly by involving them in the day-to-day operation and owning the projects. Special skills training will be given to the Physically Disabled, Women and Senior Citizens and Youths for them to have skills in the business. Young men receive extra life skills to instill a "sense of community" and responsibilities in them to care and to protect.

Targeted projects include Cattle Pen-Fattening, Dairy, Sheep, Goats, Fish Farming (Aquaponics), Rabbitry, Piggery, Poultry, Horticulture, Commercial Grain farming etc. all powered by Bio Energy. We provide the expertise and help to manage the projects until the people can manage on their own, though we continue to give advice as may be required. Some of the projects might require high capital inputs as indicated in the production costs analysis.

### **OUR LIVESTOCK DEPARTMENT**

The Livestock team, under the Livestock Production Manager, has a livestock production system that is very comprehensive, particularly in the cattle ranching, dairy, piggery, and poultry, rabbitry, and fishery development. We develop and manage animal husbandry programs that are specific to the needs of the livestock industry.

## **OUR ANIMAL HUSBANDRY PROGRAMMES INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING ELEMENTS:**

- Appropriate breed selection.
- Genetic improvement programme and individual animal selection.
- Gene marker assisted breeding.
- Herd productivity plan – conception, calving, weight gain, mortality.
- Disease, pest management.

## **FEED MANAGEMENT THROUGH:**

- Grazing management, i.e., Matching animal requirements with climate and pasture and application of appropriate stocking rates
- Increased use of fodder crops fodder conservation- i.e., on farm production of hay and silage.
- Feed- lotting, where the financial benefits are established, attention to nutrition and use of supplementation.
- Improved pasture and herd management through fencing, positioning of water, stocking rates and mustering techniques.
- The use of livestock traceability systems
